UK – DVSA Changes to the Drivers' Hours Rules for PSV

Operators. DVSA: "New regulations came into force on Monday 21 April which changed the drivers' hours rules for PSV operators. The drivers' hours guidance has now been updated to reflect these changes. Please familiarise yourself with the updated guidance and ensure you remain compliant. What you need to know – a reminder of the changes. You must follow AETR rules on international journeys. We've updated the GB domestic breaks and length of working day section in the guidance and removed the requirement to return to base or your country of residence. The changes also include:

-) an updated list of countries for the EU and non-EU
-) an updated list of what regulations apply to drivers' hours and working time
-) replacing any reference to 'EU law' with 'assimilated drivers' hours rules'.

-) updated guidance from the Traffic Commissioners on maintaining compliance;
-) additional guidance for driver checks on vehicles in arduous conditions and
-) clearer requirements for brake assessments, risk assessments and Electronic Brake Performance Monitoring Systems

GB - Integrating Rail and Community Transport. CTA's Director for Scotland David Kelly writes: "A lack of integration with other transport modes has been a long-standing issue for our sector. Community Transport is too often sidelined in strategic transport planning and treated in isolation when local bus, rail, tram or ferry services are being designed..." A DfT consultation



has recently sought "views on new policies to be included in the forthcoming Railways Bill, which will enable the establishment of Great British Railways (GBR). GBR will be a "single directing mind" that will run our rail infrastructure and passenger services in the public interest." CTA's response is available here:

Ealing Community Transport has been informed by Ealing Council that the rent on its site in Greenford is to increase by 150% and be back-dated

for two years. Consequently ECT is now facing a bill of £158,000 a year, increased from £63,000. An Ealing Council spokesperson said: "ECT has benefited from having its rent held at a low level for a significant number of years. In line with recent legislation, the council needs to be transparent in the provision of any subsidies, including rental subsidies and



must not distort market competition by doing so. The council carried out a rent review of ECT, in line with their lease, as part of standard commercial practice. This review was based on market evidence, and the figure represents a number of factors, including a significant increase in demand for industrial land and because costs, such as utilities, which have risen sharply recently, are included as part of the rent. In addition, as this is a five-year rent review, any increase is compounded compared to a year-on-year rent increase." Liberal Democrat Cllr Andrew Steed questioned: "Is this part of a bigger stealth programme by Ealing Labour to reduce costs and cut services for vulnerable residents, like the proposed closure of Michael Flanders and Cowgate centres, as well as a proposal to reduce children's centres?" West Sussex – Inclusive New Transport Initiatives by Chichester Festival Theatre. In an effort to enable more people to

attend its shows this season, Chichester Festival Theatre is offering two new, free transport schemes to its customers. The Theatre Bus is a regular free electric shuttle bus linking Chichester rail station with the theatre for Saturday matinees, as well as a community bus running from Pagham for selected performances for every production this season. Ben Geering, head of customer operations at the theatre, said: "Spurred on by theatregoers who find the 20-minute walk to and from the station tricky, we're delighted to be collaborating with local community transport organisations, Community Transport Sussex, and Pagham and District Residents Association, on this free initiative. Spaces must be pre-booked from CFT's box office and all transport is accessible to wheelchair users. CFT's free companion service, CFT Buddies, is also piloting new Travel Buddies to assist patrons who can't travel

to the theatre alone or by public transport. Available to anyone living within a 45-minute drive time of Chichester, Travel Buddies can collect patrons from their home, take them to the theatre, keep them company and assist with any needs during the performance, then drive them home afterwards. Buddies are friendly, trained volunteers who are all passionate about sharing their love for theatre. The free scheme is especially suitable for people with access needs; elderly and/or socially isolated individuals; autistic, neurodivergent and/or people with a learning disability; or anyone who is anxious about coming to the theatre alone."

LinkUp community bus is now extending its hours between April and June to 8am to 6pm Monday to Saturday in a move to help commuters, shoppers and students. Lichfield District Council said: "The response to LinkUp has been encouraging and we are delighted to extend the service hours to offer residents even more flexibility. Scotland - Strathclyde Funding for CT Providers. A recent report has indicated Strathclyde Partnership for Transport (SPT) operations committee is to provide funding support for community transport as follows:

) £30,900 Ardgowan Hospice

£25,000 Inverciyde Voluntary Council of Social Services (IVCSS)

) £12,700 Port Glasgow Voluntary Transport Group (core)

Scotland – Perth & Kinross Minibus Giveaway! Voluntary sector agencies have been able to take advantage of Perth & Kinross Council's offer to gift its retiring minibus fleet to the community via its Minibus Transfer Scheme.

The council reported that "Several well-maintained ex-PKC minibuses are

ready to find new homes with local community groups. Instead of auctioning them off, we're offering these vehicles to groups in need of transport." Interested parties have been able to attend a number of information evenings at which CTA has advised groups on minibus operations.

Scotland – Dumfries & Galloway Taxicard & CT Funding Under Review. The taxicard scheme offered by Dumfries and Galloway Council assists 2,416 mobility impaired individuals who are eligible for £100 worth of free taxi travel each year. However, an evaluation using the European Foundation for Quality Management model has resulted in the scheme receiving a score of 18 out of 30, short of the benchmark 25-30 points. Stranraer and the Rhins Councillor Willie Scobie cast doubt on the future of the scheme, saying that: "I'm guite sure the people who receive the taxicards will see they're of great benefit. But when you look at it in terms of £100, with the increase in taxi fares there has been, I would say it's something in the region of a fiver. That's one way, and then a fiver back. So rather than 20 journeys, you're getting 10. Just 10 throughout the year. When I come back to the ones that use it, they'll see this as great value. But is it really? Are we benefitting from that £100, or do we really need to look at increasing that £100 to something more realistic? In terms of using the service once per week to go for your shopping, that would only give you 10 weeks." Service manager Mark Molloy added: "the community transport and taxicard scheme were two of the lowest scored projects - that's not to say that they're not making a significant difference to individuals. But if you compare them against the other projects using that consistent (EFQM) framework, they do rank as some of the bottom projects. In terms of the budget and amount of money, the officers are delivering the project in line with the agreed budget that's there. As inflation goes up, running costs for taxis go up to ensure they have a fair livelihood, that does result in people have less journeys due to the available budget." https://hellorayo.co.uk/greatest-hits/dumfries/news/taxi-card-scheme-underscrutiny/

Essex – Epping Forest & Harlow CT Minibus Stolen. A major setback has occurred at Epping Forest & Harlow Community Transport when a key accessible minibus was stolen during the night from Epping. The vehicle was a yellow Mercedes Sprinter was taken sometime after 8 p.m. on Wednesday 23 April. The operator commented: "This is a lifeline for so many people, for some of our clients, this is the only way they can get out of the house and stay connected with the community. To have it taken from us is not just theft—it's taking away someone's independence. The charity operates on limited funds and relies heavily on volunteers and donations. This theft is a huge blow to our operations. Wales – Funding Package for Pembrokeshire CT Operators. Innovative CT development and support agency Pembrokeshire Association of Community Transport Organisations (PACTO) has secured over

£213,000 from Pembrokeshire County Council. The grant is to ensure continuation of PACTO's work over the next five years. Cllr Rhys Sinnett described PACTO as "the glue that knits community transport providers together," and the members' report commented that:



"Community transport services in Pembrokeshire currently provide around 50,000 passenger journeys each year, helping to fill gaps in the public transport network, support community groups with their transport needs and assist elderly, disabled and other vulnerable people who struggle to access mainstream public transport. PACTO does not directly operate community transport services. Its role is to provide support to community transport operators to improve and extend the services they offer, to work with communities and community groups towards addressing unmet transport needs, and to provide information and advice to service users about the services that may be able to assist them."

The service will involve two new minibuses to be driven by volunteers, serving six areas including Teign Valley, Chudleigh, Bovey, Ashburton, Haytor and Ambrook. Cllr Stuart Rogers commented: "We're really excited to have purchased these additional minibuses with the government funding to help increase the community transport offering across Teignbridge. All organisations involved have come together to bid for the funding to make this happen and we know it will make a massive difference to our communities. However, to make sure the new services are a success, we really want to recruit some additional volunteer drivers. The volunteer drivers we currently have do a fantastic job and we'd really like more people to join them. They give up their time to help our residents get to appointments, pick up shopping and other essentials, and without them our community transport services, which are the lifeline for some rural communities, wouldn't be able to run." Dorset – Lyme Regis Community Bus is Launched. A new free community bus service has commenced operations around Lyme Regis. The Lyme Link is operated by Lyme Regis Town Council after funding for the No.71 bus was withdrawn by Dorset Council in August last year. Shildon CT says: "Our older bus, which has a boot, is nearing the end of its useful life and we cannot service our client base with just one mini bus. We promote social inclusion by providing transport for social, leisure and educational outings. We support social groups based within a 10-mile radius of Shildon. Our weekly shopping trips picking up in Newton Aycliffe and Shildon are very popular...All of these need to access a bus with a sizeable boot to enable equipment and shopping to be transported safely. Examples of our affiliated groups include a walking group and sports supporters. Our second bus cannot be used for these groups as the tail lift leaves no storage space. We have almost reached the final amount that we

Hampshire – Plans for CT and School Transport Integration. Budgetary constraints have been plaguing Hampshire County Council for the past couple of years, and the CT sector has borne its share of the brunt which has resulted in much uncertainty for future service sustainability. A new plan has been proposed to combine CT and some Home to School services within a single contract. The current plan "would involve using some of the contract hours procured through Connect service contracts to provide school transport journeys, where possible...the report indicated that to ensure the continuation of community transport services, services would be combined with school transport provision. 'Connect', formerly Dial a Ride and Call & Go, is a prebookable service that provides transport to those who cannot use conventional bus services, primarily frail, older and disabled people. In Hampshire, the service supports 55,000 passengers a year. 'Connect: Minibus Hire' services allow local voluntary and community groups, schools and local councils to hire fully accessible minibuses for regular or one-off trips, with or without a driver. The combined system will provide school transport and between 9am to 2.30pm vehicles will be used to provide core Connect services."

Derbyshire – Belper CT Fills the Void. When Derbyshire CT ceased operations last year, residents of Belper were left without an accessible transport service. Local people have now formed a Community Interest Company Belper Community Transport, which has taken over operation of a minibus and two MPVs that were formerly owned by Derbyshire CT, and has raised £39,000. One of the founders is Siobhan Fennell who said: "I have become housebound for the last few months. I have been so isolated. You tend to get a bit lonely because you are not able to get out and see your friends or go to hospital appointments."
